SECTION 1: INTRODUCTION

OVERVIEW

Welcome to the 2026-2027 High School Skating season!

High School Team Skating is a program run by the High School Programs Subcommittee under the Programs and New Program Development Committee of U.S. Figure Skating. The mission of this program is to support student athletes in their high school development through their chosen sport of figure skating.

High school skaters may form teams to compete on behalf of their high school or a combination of high schools, per the eligibility and team formation rules listed in this handbook. High school skating competitions (i.e. competitions offering high school skating events or stand-alone high school competitions) are to be run as sanctioned U.S. Figure Skating non-qualifying competitions per Rule 1021 in the U.S. Figure Skating Rulebook, and the requirements outlined in this handbook. Compete USA only competitions cannot offer high school events.

All officials for High School competitions or events at High School Competitions must be selected from the official lists set forth in the current directory, be currently registered with U.S. Figure Skating and be otherwise in good standing under U.S. Figure Skating rules. If holding IJS events, the officials must be trained to function in the IJS. See rule 3030 for levels of required officials.

Athletes participating in these events are considered student-athletes. Their education is of the highest priority, and in all decision-making matters, the Programs & New Program Development Committee, and the local organizing committees (LOC) have a responsibility to minimize the days missed from school.

KEY SEASON DATES

Renewal season runs from October 1 through September 30. The official start of the 2026-2027 season is October 1, 2026. Teams can start registration/renewal beginning September 1.

The high school skating program aligns with the traditional school year with many competitions taking place between October through April. However, high school skating competitions may take place at any point throughout the year, as allowed by state athletic association guidelines.

In addition to sanctioned non-qualifying high school skating competitions held around the country, the Programs & New Program Development Committee looks forward to facilitating the following competition opportunities, open to all registered high school skating teams during the 2026-2027 season:

- 2027 Cyber Challenge: January 2027-April 2027
- 2027 Sectional High School Finals: TBA, Spring 2027

ELIGIBILITY & TEAM FORMATION

Athletes must be eligible members in good standing of U.S. Figure Skating or Learn to Skate USA® and may be members of the figure skating club of their choice or be individual members of U.S. Figure Skating.

All skaters must be enrolled as a full-time student as defined by the institution that they attend, grades 9-12, as per state guidelines. This includes traditional, online, and home-schooled students. High school seniors that are rostered on a team for the current high school skating season and graduate in the spring may remain on the team roster and compete through the end of September of their graduation year. However, once the new season begins on October 1, graduates are no longer eligible and must be removed from the roster. Incoming 9th grade high school students may be added starting October 1, marking the beginning of the first full season for which they are eligible.

A minimum of two (2) skaters are required to form a team. Team members may include skaters of any gender. Skaters do not have to be at the same test or competitive level.

Athletes may compete either for the high school they are attending, or as a high school collaborative, defined as follows:

- Athletes from a single school, representing that school, OR
- Athletes representing two or more area high schools combining to form a team.

TEAM REPRESENTATION

Competitors **may not** represent more than ONE high school skating team at one time.

Skaters wishing to change their team representation mid-season must submit the [High School Team Representation Change Request form](#). We kindly ask that athletes inform the team(s) involved to ensure that all parties are aware of the situation.

HIGH SCHOOL SKATING TEAM MEMBERSHIP

All High School Skating Teams participating in high school competitions must register with U.S. Figure Skating on the Members Only website. This will include creating a team roster to include all skaters on your team and paying the annual team dues of \$50, which are payable starting September 1.

All teams must have at least one Team Manager who is 18 years or older, must have a current U.S. Figure Skating membership, and be fully compliant. Team coaches are not required in order to form a team. However, if a team chooses to have a team coach, this person may also serve as the team manager.

COMPLIANCE

All Team Managers assigned on Members Only must have a green lighted background check and completed SafeSport™ Training. Team Managers are required to be at least 18 years old and have a current U.S. Figure Skating membership.

Coaches assigned on Members Only must complete all applicable compliance requirements. Details regarding Coach compliance requirements can be found [HERE](#).

Teams that are composed of both Minor Athletes and Adult Participants (skaters over the age of 18) are required to complete an extra step for compliance. Athletes who are 18 at the time of team registration or turn 18 in the middle of the season are deemed Mandatory Athletes. Mandatory Athletes must complete SafeSport™ training on or before their 18th birthday.

All skaters on the team roster are required to complete the mandatory waivers, medical registry, and emergency contact information.

SECTION 2: EVENTS OFFERED

Events offered within the High School Competitions may include the following:

- Team Maneuvers (Levels A, B, C, & D)
- Short Program (Juvenile-Senior)
- Compete USA (Basic 1-6)
- Excel Free Skate (Aspire 1-Senior)
- Championship Free Skate (Junior and Senior)
- Solo Pattern Dance (Preliminary-International)
- Solo Free Dance (Juvenile-Senior)
- Showcase (Aspire-Senior)
- Athlete Development (Aspire-Senior)
- Special Olympics/Adaptive Skating

Artistic Free Skate was discontinued as of 7/1/2026.

It is at the discretion of each LOC to determine which events and levels to offer at each competition.

Age restrictions for event offerings may be waived, with prior permission from the appropriate program subcommittee. Deviations from age restrictions must be outlined clearly in the competition announcement.

SECTION 3: GENERAL COMPETITION RULES

The following section contains competition rules for high school skating competitions. Competitions should utilize the most current [standard non-qualifying announcement template](#) (Members Only > Clubs > Hosting an Event > Hosting an Event > Competition Sanctions) for all requirements at high school skating competitions, except where this document deviates from the requirements listed in that document.

TEST LEVEL ELIGIBILITY

Singles Excel and Championship Track Events:

- Skaters must meet at least the minimum singles test requirements for the event's level. A skater's singles test level may be higher than the minimum requirement.
 - Skate Up (If allowed at your competition): skaters may skate up one level higher than their highest singles test level allows.
- Skaters may not register for an event level lower than allowed by their competitive floor. An athlete's competitive floor is set by one of the following scenarios:
 - If an athlete has a paid EMS series registration for the NQS series, the event level registered for in the most recent NQS will become the lowest level they may compete at in any U.S. Figure Skating sanctioned event.
 - If an athlete has a paid EMS series registration for the Excel Series, the event level registered for in the most recent Excel series will become the lowest level they may compete in any Excel event. For Championship Track and Specialty events the skater will be permitted to register at one level lower than the "floor" set by their excel series entry.
 - If an athlete has never had a paid EMS series registration in the NQS or Excel Series, the athlete may select their level based on their goals and technical skills as long as the minimum test requirements are met.
- Skaters are not permitted to enter an Excel free skate and a Championship Track free skate event at the same competition (example: Juvenile Girls Free Skate and Juvenile Girls Excel Free Skate). However, they are permitted to enter an Excel and a Championship Track event of different types such as a short program (if stand-alone event option), specialty, or showcase events (example: Intermediate Women Short Program and Intermediate Women Excel Free Skate).

All other singles and partner events (such as Showcase and Solo Dance):

- Skaters must meet the minimum test requirements for the events level but not exceed the maximum permissible test requirement.

Team Maneuver Events:

- Athletes may "skate up" but they may not compete on a team at a lower level than the highest Singles test they have passed.

TEAM ELIGIBILITY

All teams must be eligible, registered teams, as defined in Section 1 of this handbook.

Competitions may put a limit to the number of entries a skater can sign up for and/or the number of total entries a team registers. Entry limits, if any, should be clearly outlined in the competition announcement.

Not all skaters on the team's roster must be assigned to an event. Unassigned skaters may be used for substitutions. Best practice for maintaining a roster to be used for substitutions will be up to the LOC/Interclub/Series administration organization.

Skaters may enter individual events and/or team maneuver events.

REGISTRATION & ENTRIES

Competition LOCs may use their preferred method of processing registration, which must be clearly outlined in the competition announcement. Competition announcement should specify:

- Registration process for the competition (online management software, etc.)
- Entry fees
- How entry fees will be collected
- Any additional fees that may be collected
- Late entry policies
- How substitutions, additions, and changes to a team's roster will be handled

Entry fees will be determined at the discretion of the LOC.

The LOC reserves the right to limit the number of entries, eliminate events due to insufficient entries, combine or divide groups as necessary, and eliminate events if necessary to accommodate the amount of available ice.

If entry fee revenue exceeds competition expenses, profits may go into the host team's account for future team support or scholarship intention.

TEAM REGISTRATION FORM

Each team may be required to submit a roster containing the skaters' information, including team representation, contact information, and planned events. LOCs may opt to use their own method for collecting team information or are free to use this [Sample Event Roster Form](#).

- Download the form from and complete and submit the excel saved version to the LOC.
- The event roster form should be completed and sent to the LOC within **the given timeframe outlined in the competition announcement or official communication from the LOC.**
- Changes to rosters after the close of entries is at the discretion of the LOC and Chief Referee for the competition.

- Substitutions may be permitted, at the discretion of the LOC. Substitutes should be listed on the entry roster, even if they have no events assigned to them.

TEAM MANEUVERS

Team maneuvers events consist of teams of **no fewer than two (2) and no more than the maximum number of elements being offered at the competition** (any mix of gender) from the same high school team.

The LOC may opt to use only the 9 core elements per level or add the optional 4th element for a total of 12 elements per level.

- The same number of elements **must** be used for each level. Ex: If an LOC chooses to use only the 9 core elements, all levels (A, B, C, and D) must use only the 9 core elements.
- The choice to utilize 12 elements must be noted clearly in the competition announcement and communicated to teams prior to the start of events. If an LOC is opting to use the optional 4th element, then they must use the 4th element in all levels and element categories.
- Optional elements are not to be rotated in for other elements. If the 4th optional element is used then all 12 elements must be used for all levels.

No one skater is allowed to perform more than 5 elements if 9 elements are used or 6 elements if 12 elements are used.

Teams must attempt all listed elements in each category.

- Each team will have only one skater assigned per element. Teams cannot assign two skaters to the same element.
- If a competitor performs an element different than that listed, that element will receive no value. For example, if the element specified is a single Salchow jump and the competitor performs a double Salchow jump, no value is given for this element.

Competitions hosting High School Team Maneuvers events must use the elements as listed on the Team Maneuvers requirement chart.

The LOC will determine whether high school teams may enter one or two (maximum) entries at the same team maneuvers level. ***This must be clearly stated in the competition announcement and communicated to teams prior to the start of events.***

An athlete may only compete on one team maneuvers team at one level per competition.

No re-skate or re-try for elements will be permitted.

See Appendix A for How to Run a Team Maneuvers Event. Appendices B, C, and D provide information for scoring officials, referees, and judges on how to build and score Team Maneuvers events.

PHOTO/VIDEO

Live and on-demand streaming, and sales and distribution of U.S. Figure Skating sanctioned and approved events, programs, and activities that include the playback of music is strictly prohibited. This prohibition does not apply to the distribution of footage that does not include music. Questions about this can be directed to music@usfigureskating.org.

LENGTH OF COMPETITION

If the number of entries exceeds the available ice time for the competition, the LOC chair, in conjunction with the chief referee may choose one or more of the following methods to reduce the length of the competition:

- Eliminate the optional dance in the solo dance event.
- Reduce the number of starts per team.
- Eliminate ladies' events with only one entry. (Men's events will not be eliminated.)

RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PARTICIPATING TEAMS

It is each participating team's responsibility to review the competition schedule for accuracy within 72 hours of receipt and notify the competition chair of any errors.

GROUP SIZE AND COMPOSITION

No group will consist of more than 12 skaters. If more than 12 skaters are entered into one level, the skaters will be split as evenly as possible into as many groups as necessary to keep each group no larger than 12 skaters.

If an event has 12 or more skaters and is split into two or more groups, groups may be split randomly. However, it is recommended that all groups be split in a manner that distributes skaters from schools with more than one start in a particular event as evenly as possible.

Team Maneuvers

Each team maneuvers level will be judged as one event even if there are more than 12 teams (ex: Level A Team Maneuvers is one event) regardless of how many warm up groups are used to facilitate skater safety.

Singles Excel and Championship Track events will be split and judged as women's events and men's events unless otherwise directed by program requirements and guidelines. Solo Dance and showcase events will not be split by gender.

START ORDERS

Start orders for all events will be by random draw and posted either at the competition or via an online leaderboard.

WARMUP GROUP SIZE AND TIME

All warm-up group sizes are at the discretion of the referee with skater safety being the primary concern. The warmup for events with a small number of entries may be combined without regard to gender.

Team Maneuvers Warm Up: For guidelines regarding how to run team maneuver events and warm ups, review Appendix A: How to Run a Team Maneuvers Event.

JUDGING SYSTEM

Showcase events and Team Maneuvers events will be judged using the Component Judging System (CJS). All other events may use either CJS or the International Judging System (IJS). Please refer to the [Scoring System page](#) on the U.S. Figure Skating website for additional information on CJS.

AWARDS

Medals will be awarded to places first through third in each event. Team trophies may be awarded for team maneuvers in lieu of individual medals. Medals or ribbons may be awarded for fourth place at the discretion of the LOC.

LOCKER ROOMS AND CHANGING AREAS

GENERAL LOCKER ROOMS:

Locker rooms and changing areas at U.S. Figure Skating competitive events are for athletes only, will be labeled with regard to specific use, and where identified will be gender specific. An exception can be made for Minor Athletes under 11 years old that will allow for one parent of the same sex to assist their child immediately prior to and after their skating event(s). Please review the Locker Room and Changing Area Policy and the SkateSafe Handbook (both found on the [U.S. Figure Skating SkateSafe](#) page). Locker Room signage can also be found on the SkateSafe® page under "[Resources](#)".

TEAM LOCKER ROOMS:

The designated team Coach, Team Manager, one additional Team Service Personnel and athletes competing at the skating event are allowed in the Locker Rooms/Changing Area designated for their team. The Coach, Team Manager, and Team Service Personnel **must** remove themselves from the Locker Room while any Minor Athletes are actively changing or undressing. All Locker Rooms/Changing Areas will be monitored. If any concerns arise, immediately contact the Locker Room Monitor. If there are concerns regarding this policy, an athlete should change prior to arriving at the competition. The use of any recording and photographic devices inside a Locker Room/Changing Area is strictly prohibited. Any violation of the Locker Room policy should be reported to U.S. Figure Skating using [this reporting form](#).

SECTION 4: AWARDING OF THE INDIVIDUAL/TEAM POINTS:

Individual Points:

Points are awarded to all skaters who compete. Championship Junior Free Skate, Championship Senior Free Skate, and International Solo Pattern Dance events earn two additional points per placement.

Team Maneuver Points:

Points are awarded to all team maneuvers teams that compete. Points are awarded to the team maneuvers team as a whole, and not per skater in the event.

Ties:

In the case of a tie, skaters will share available points (ex: tie for 1st and 2nd place - 12 points + 10 points / 2 skaters = 11 points for each skater). For ties that cannot be evenly split, the split will be carried out to two decimal places without rounding (ex: 3 way tie for 1st, 2nd, 3rd places: 12 points + 10 points + 9 points / 3 skaters = 10.33 points for each team).

Withdrawals:

The number of skaters in an event will be based on the number of competitors who actually skate at the competition.

APPENDIX A: HOW TO RUN A TEAM MANEUVERS EVENT

Each level (A, B, C, D) will be held as an event (ex: Level A Team Maneuvers is one event).

Events are conducted separately from each other (i.e. Level A Team Maneuvers will be completed in its entirety before Level B, etc.).

It is at the discretion of the Chief Referee to limit the number of skaters/teams on the ice during a level event. For example, if 8 teams register for a Level A Team Maneuver event, it is recommended to:

- Split the event into 2 warm up groups (ex: Event 101 Team A warm up group 1 and Event 102 Team A warm up group 2); **OR**
- Have all teams on the ice against the boards at the same time (if space is available and does not compromise skater safety) but split warm ups as follows:
 - a. Teams 1-4 will do their one-minute stroking warm up
 - b. Each skater from teams 1-4 will do their warm up for the 1st element
 - c. The 1st element will be performed by each team
 - d. Repeat steps b and c until all of the elements have been performed by teams 1-4
 - e. Teams 5-8 will do their one-minute stroking warm up
 - f. Repeat steps b, c, and d for Teams 5-8

****Event levels with multiple warm-ups are still judged together as one group (even if over 12 teams).****

Running the event:

- Teams will line up along the board opposite the judges and facing the judges. Teams may be assigned a place to line up along the barrier and should remain on the ice for their entire event.
- Athletes will have a general warm-up of stroking-only for 1 minute at the beginning of each level (or at the beginning of each warm up group in a level). Only forward skating (e.g. stroking, cross-rolls, swizzles, cross-overs) is allowed during the one-minute warmup. Skaters should return to the boards at the conclusion of the warm-up.
- The event referee will then call for a 30 second warm up for all skaters performing the announced element (or separated into separate warm up groups for safety, if needed). Only the announced element and only the skaters performing that element

may participate in the 30 second warm up. Skaters should return to the boards at the conclusion of the warm-up.

- Each skater will then be called to perform the announced element. Elements will be skated one-at-a-time, and the announcer will call the representative from each team when it is the team's turn to perform the prescribed element.
- This process will be repeated for all elements per warm up group/per level.
- Team skate order will not rotate between elements.

Example:

All skaters performing the first jump for Level A Team Maneuvers will receive a 30 second warm up for that element. Then each team will be called and the skater will perform the first jump element.

Once that element has fully concluded, a 30 second warm up for the second jump element will be called, and this process will continue until all elements have been concluded.

Estimated time Allotment for Team Maneuvers event

1-minute stroking warm up

30-seconds per element (Jumps, Spins, and Step or Skating Skills Sequence)

Allotment for Performance Time

Estimated 30 seconds per element

Example of timing for an event with 4 teams

APPENDIX B: CJS SCORING INFORMATION FOR SCORING OFFICIALS - TEAM MANEUVERS

****Use manual scoring for Team Maneuvers****

All judges and referees should use the worksheets to write element execution (referee) and GOEs (judges). Scoring of the event can be done manually in the scoring room or rinkside.

All elements will start with code TM with a base value of 3.00. The Event Referee will determine if the element is executed accordingly (TM1) or is not according to requirements/no value (TM) and indicate TM or TM1 for each element for each team on the referee/judging worksheet.

There are no program components. There are no separate deductions outside of what the judges will account for in their GOEs. Falls will be reflected in the GOE only.

Each GOE is worth 0.50 points.

Building the event in ISUCalcFS:

- This will be classified the same as Athlete Development events - use the Athlete Development tab on the CJS chart:
 - Category: Compulsory Moves, Male/Female, Single
 - Segment: Short Program
 - Remove (delete) all of the deductions
 - CSO can use the team name where we would normally put the name of the individual skater

APPENDIX C: CJS SCORING INFORMATION FOR REFEREES - TEAM MANEUVERS

All elements in a Team Maneuvers event will start with code TM with a base value of 3.00.

The Event Referee will determine if each element's execution meets the requirement per the Team Maneuvers chart (TM1) or if it is not according to requirements/no value (TM) and indicate TM or TM1 for each element for each team on the judging worksheet and return it to the Scoring Official or SST at the end of the event.

There are no program components.

There are no separate deductions outside of what the judges will account for in their GOEs. Falls will be reflected by GOE only.

No value/Not according to requirements examples:

- Requirement is a double-double combination jump and skater performs a double-single, single-single, triple-single, etc...
- Requirement is for a CCoSp and skater performs CoSp (using codes as example but TM would still be the actual code on the sheet)
- Requirement is for a flying sit spin but the skater does not fly
- Requirement is edge element and skater performs a combination edge element
- Requirement is edge element and skater performs choreographic sliding movement
- Requirement is a 1A and skater does a 2A
- Skater falls on the first jump when the requirement is a combo
- Skaters does more than the allotted element
- Required jump combination but the skater falls on the first jump)
- Requirement is Forward sit spin (NO variations) but skater adds variations to the spin

APPENDIX D: CJS SCORING INFORMATION FOR JUDGES - TEAM MANEUVERS

Team Maneuver events will be judged using a GOE based approach where all elements are weighted equally and judges assess the quality of the element.

The referee will determine if the skater executes the element per the requirements. If executed accordingly, the referee will give the element a code of TM1. If not executed accordingly, the referee will give it the element code of TM.

Judges will award a GOE from -5 to 5 to each element for each team.

- Please use the latest ISU guidelines for marking GOEs for each element.
- Specialty events do not have skater music playing, so please disregard all GOE criteria pertaining to matching the music. Element types with "matches the music" criteria mandatory for awarding higher than a +3 can be disregarded if the element meets 4 or 5 bullets.
